COVID-19 case and vaccination numbers

The latest advice from the Chief Health Officer

- **Summary:** as of **Thursday 29 July**, in Western Australia (WA), there have been:
 - **1,057** confirmed cases of COVID-19 notified
 - 99 historical cases of COVID-19 notified
 - **1,032** people recover from COVID-19
 - **1,505,327** COVID-19 tests conducted

South Australia to medium risk

Following updated health advice, as of 12:00pm 22 July 2021 South Australia transitioned from a 'low risk' jurisdiction to a 'medium risk' jurisdiction under the [controlled border](#) arrangement.

Travel into Western Australia requires an exemption through a [G2G PASS](#). This also applies to anyone who has been in South Australia since Thursday July 8 and has not completed 14 days of quarantine in a lower risk jurisdiction. Travellers must:

- self-quarantine in a suitable premises for 14 days
- present for an initial COVID-19 test within 48 hours of arrival
- present for a COVID-19 test if any symptoms develop during quarantine
- present for a COVID-19 test on day 12 after arrival in WA (if still in WA).

Travellers who have been in South Australia recently should continue to monitor the listed [exposure sites](#) in case additional locations are added. Queries should be referred to 13 COVID (13 26843).

Anyone who arrived prior to 12:00pm 22 July 2021 should continue to comply with the Directions provided to them upon entry. See the requirements under the 'low risk' settings in the [announcement](#).

Masks should be worn when transiting to a self-quarantine premises and presenting for COVID-19 testing. [COVID clinic](#) information is available on HealthyWA.

Jurisdiction risk rating

South Australia, New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland are considered 'medium risk'. Australian Capital Territory is considered 'low risk'. Northern Territory, Tasmania and New Zealand are considered 'very low risk'. For more information on WA's border arrangement, see the WA Government's controlled interstate border [webpage](#).

Vessel management

WA Health is currently monitoring two vessels berthed at Fremantle Port that have confirmed cases of COVID-19 among crew.

WA Health is working closely with key stakeholders, (including the Captains, shipping agents, vessel owners, WA Police, Fremantle Port Authority, and Commonwealth agencies) to ensure the safe management of the crew and vessels.

Every precaution is being taken to ensure the safety of port workers and the WA Community.

BBC California

Crew members from the *BBC California* were tested onsite to assess their COVID-19 status. Several crew members, who tested negative to COVID-19, were disembarked at Fremantle Port and transferred to a State Supervised Quarantine Facility (hotel quarantine). Appropriate infection prevention and control (IPC) measures were adhered to during the transfer, including the use of personal protective equipment (PPE). The positive cases remain onboard the vessel (along with one negative case considered essential for onboard operations) and are being monitored daily.

MV Darya Krishna

Three confirmed COVID-19 cases from the *MV Darya Krishna* were transferred to Fiona Stanley Hospital (FSH). There are another 6 confirmed cases on board the vessel. WA Health is investigating an incident that took place at FSH during the emergency transfer from the helipad to a designated lift. Staff managing the three crew members were fully vaccinated and wearing PPE, as they were transferred to their respective wards, however, a technical fault meant two staff (unrelated to the transfer) were able to access the lift used for the transfer prior to it being cleaned.

Out of an abundance of caution the two FSH staff members involved in the incident are undergoing 14 days quarantine in a hotel.

Community

Contact registers

The WA Government recently announced there are over two million users of the free [SafeWA app](#), with over 300 million scans since its launch.

[Contact registers](#) are an important tool in managing COVID-19 outbreaks. They allow the Public Health team (contact tracers) to identify people who may have been exposed to COVID-19 while in the community and the SafeWA app is a very quick and efficient way to collect this information. This was highlighted during the recent cluster of local community cases in Perth that were linked to the NSW outbreak.

All businesses and venues are encouraged to provide contact registers. The WA government has developed a [best practice guide](#) to help businesses ensure visitors are checking in on entry. This includes:

- displaying signs clearly and prominently
- adding reminders around the venue (in bathrooms, at the counter, on menus etc.)
- using posters and other free assets available online
- providing digital and manual options.

We all have a part to play in keeping WA safe. If you are a business owner, make sure your contact register is easy to access and if you're a visitor to a venue, make sure you check in.

COVID-19 vaccination program

Western Australians are urged to book an appointment for a vaccination as soon as they are eligible, to help protect ourselves, our families and our communities from COVID-19.

TGA change in vaccination guidelines for children 12-15 years

While the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has approved use of the Pfizer vaccine for children aged 12-15 years, this cohort is not yet eligible to receive a vaccine.

WA Health does not have confirmation as to when the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) and the Australian Government are likely to make a decision regarding eligibility for this age group.

When the Australian Government and ATAGI advise that this age group is eligible, information will be published on the Roll Up for WA [website](#) and messaged through media.

- Perth CBD** Perth Convention and Exhibition Centre, 21 Mounts Bay Road Perth, short walk from Elizabeth Quay train station.
Operating [from 16 August](#) and offering Pfizer and open Monday - Friday.
- Midland** Centrepont Shopping Centre, 307 Great Eastern Highway Midland, short walk from Midland train station. (Replacing Redcliffe).
Operating [from 6 September](#) and offering Pfizer and open 7 days a week.
- Busselton** Youth and Community Activities Building, 21 Foreshore Parade.
Open every Tuesday and Friday and offering Pfizer.
- Manjimup** Manjimup Town Hall, 37-39 Rose Street.
Operating [from 29 July](#) and offering Pfizer every Thursday.

Existing [Community clinics](#) in WA include Claremont Showgrounds, Joondalup, Kwinana, Redcliffe and Bunbury.

The Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine is now being rolled out to, and administered by, General Practitioners (GPs) in WA. Approved pharmacies can also now administer the AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine for eligible populations. Participating GPs and pharmacies can be found by using the [COVID-19 Vaccine Eligibility Checker](#).

Those in self-quarantine are not permitted to leave the suitable premises (e.g. the home) to receive a COVID-19 vaccination. Appointments during this period should be rescheduled by:

- Logging into [VaccinateWA](#) for appointments at a state-run vaccination clinic or calling 13 COVID (13 26843), or
- Contacting your GP or primary-care provider for appointments at participating GPs, pharmacies and respiratory clinics.

Anyone having difficulties booking on VaccinateWA can call 13 COVID (13 26843) for assistance.

Testing

Presentation for Testing Directions

Amendments to the Presentation for Testing Directions have come into effect. Significant changes include the requirement for certain return travellers to present for testing:

- on day **6 after arrival for all people who are subject to modified quarantine directions or the government official requirements**
- on day 12 after arrival (to replace Day 11 testing)
- post-quarantine (days 17 and 21).

General population [testing criteria](#)

Any person may be tested if they have any one of the following clinical criteria: fever ($\geq 37.5^{\circ}\text{C}$) OR history of fever (e.g. night sweats, chills), without a known source **OR** acute respiratory symptoms (e.g. shortness of breath, cough, sore throat, runny nose) **OR** acute loss of smell or taste.

Australian Health Protection Principal Committee (AHPPC)

The [Australian Health Protection Principal Committee \(AHPPC\)](#) is the key decision-making committee for health emergencies. It is comprised of all state and territory Chief Health Officers and is chaired by the Australian Chief Medical Officer. The AHPPC has an ongoing role to advise the Australian Health Ministers' Advisory Council (AHMAC) on health protection matters and national priorities. AHPPC is also tasked with the role of mitigating emerging health threats related to infectious diseases, the environment as well as natural and human made disasters.
